

It was in 1924 that Mrs. Annie Witt came to Fletcher, with her three small father-less children, to teach in the community school. During the four years spent in teaching the children, she won their love; and the influence she exerted is still felt and talked about as the children have grown to men and women.

To broaden her usefulness to humanity, Mrs. Witt took nurses training; then worked in the Out-Patient Department for five years with Doctors Brownsberger and Bliss. After that she worked for many years as supervisor in the hospital on the seven to three shift. For twenty-two years she helped with the teaching in the Nurses Training School.

The way was not easy for Mrs. Witt with her three children to rear, train, support and educate; but with her faith and trust in God as her Guide and Helper she perserved so now they endeavor to show their love and appreciation for her efforts in their behalf.

During the years spent in connection with her teaching and hospital work "Mama Witt" won the hearts of those on the campus and in the community. She loved and served the people of the community and thought of them as "my people". In return they have responded by their interest and expressions of appreciation for her helpful kindness to them through the years she was here.

In May, 1956, Mrs. Witt found that her heart must have rest from such a full program. After an enforced rest she retired from her work at Fletcher. Surely we miss her in many ways, but her influence lives on in our lives and in the work of our Institution of which she was so much a part. We are thankful she has regained her health so she can help with the teaching in the Church School at Morris, Pa. where she is making her home with her son, Paul, and his family.
