


TUMBLING TEAM

The summer of 1966 has not been a record year for farm products at Fletcher. There were several hail storms which did damage to the first tomatoes so they had to be replanted, and to some of the apples and grapes. Then, as I understand, because of an abundance of rain at certain times, the corn crop was delayed in maturing. Still we can be very thankful for our Heavenly Father's blessings and kindness to us.

At present there are tomatoes we can serve, green beans, okra, green peppers, potatoes, and fresh garden lettuce.

Of what we have taken care of this summer to date we have:

166 gallons frozen peaches
49 gallons grape jam
18 gallons apricot jam
26 gallons apple butter
4 gallons raspberry jam
3 gallons strawberry jam
25 gallons frozen strawberries
1107 ears of frozen corn

82 gallons frozen beets
12 gallons frozen raspberries
192 gallons frozen corn
55 gallons pickles
40 gallons frozen carrots
101 gallons frozen grape juice
14 gallons frozen acorn squash

Mr. Lowder reports that besides the apples that can be put in storage for winter use, there will be quite a few gallons of apple juice to freeze.

We hope that with the blessings of the Lord our report for next year will be better.
