



# Captain Gilmer Receives High Marks in 5-year Evaluation

Every five years, Captain Gilmer School (CGS) is evaluated in order to keep our Certificate of Accreditation from the North American Division of Seventh-day Adventists current. This year, our school also applied for accreditation from S.A.C.S. (Southern Association of Colleges and Schools). There is only one other school in the Carolina Conference that has this dual accreditation, and CGS was the first to have the teams run a joint evaluation team on the same day. The team came and reviewed



the school's curriculum, staff, policies, procedures, plant facility, and over-all mission. A detailed self-study was previously done by several different committees that represented community members, staff, and parents. Teachers reviewed all the subject areas and teaching

techniques. Eight Action Plans for school improvement were designed. The evaluation team spent the entire day comparing, exploring, processing parent surveys, and interviewing students.

We are excited to report our school received the highest term of accreditation, which is a term of five years. We received the five-year term from both the North American Division and from S.A.C.S. The team stated that our school was warm, friendly, and inviting. They were pleased to know that we had accomplished 100% of the recommended items for improvement that came from the last term of accreditation, 1998-2003. The greatest news of the report came from the parent and student surveys. When parents were asked if they thought teachers held high expectations for student learning, 96% agreed. When asked if they thought the educational program offered at this school is of high quality, 92% of parents agreed. Parents were asked if they felt welcomed at the school and 100% said they did. Students were surveyed. When asked if they thought that their teachers cared about them, 98% thought that their teachers did. And best of all, 96% of the students agreed that CGS is helping them to grow spiritually.

We are looking forward to the future for our school. We want to maintain high academics and provide a great learning environment for the students. Each day we want to give students the opportunity to meet and know their Savior. We want to continue to bring honor and glory to God.

The Fletcher Spirit

When November comes I begin to think about the holidays, festivities and finances. Yes... finances. I think about finances because I have only two more months to do most of my tax planning. After December 31, most of my opportunities to save money on my taxes will have passed, so I have to think about it now. One very good way to save money on taxes is through charitable giving.



The simplest way is a direct gift of **money.** If the gift is made before the year ends, the value of the gift can be used to reduce your income tax payable for that calendar year. Your total income taxes will be reduced by your marginal tax rate times the gift. Therefore, if you were to give \$100 and you are in the 28% tax bracket you would save \$28 on you gift. Or, in other words, the cost of giving \$100 to your favorite charity would be only \$72. I know that there may be many of the younger alumni that do not yet itemize their tax deductions and therefore would not benefit from a charitable contribution. If you are in that category, you may want to follow the newspaper closely over the next two months. The US House of Representatives has passed a bill called the Charitable Giving Act of 2003. This bill is supported by the Presi-

dent and there is a similar bill in the Senate. This bill would allow everyone who takes the standard deduction for charitable giving the opportunity to deduct up to \$250 on your tax return; \$500 if you are married and filing jointly.

An even better method of making a charitable gift is to donate appreciated property. Giving marketable securities (shares, bonds and mutual or segregated fund units) directly to a charity can reduce the cost of your gift even further. How can that be? Well, if it is long-term capital gain property (held for more than one year), you will not have to pay any capital gains tax on the gain, but you get to deduct the fair market value of the property on your tax return. Let's say you have a stock for which you paid \$1,000, you have held it longer than a year, and it is now worth \$3,000. If you sold the stock, it would generate a capital gain of \$2,000 which would likely be taxed at the 15% rate. If you give the property to charity, you get a charitable deduction of \$3,000, which, if you are in the 28% tax bracket, would be worth \$840 in tax savings. And you would avoid the capital gains tax of \$300. Therefore it would be possible to save more in taxes (\$800 + \$300 = \$1,100) than you paid for the asset.

Another way to assist a charity is through a charitable remainder trust. This may be appropriate if you want to leave a portion of your estate to charity but need those assets to support your current lifestyle. A charitable remainder trust is created by putting assets into a trust. The charity is named residual beneficiary of the trust. As the settler of the trust, you qualify for a tax credit equal to a portion of the value of the assets you put in—the older you are, the higher the portion will be. The trust then provides income to you for your lifetime and the capital (the residual

interest or remainder) passes to the charity at your death. If you are considering such a gift please see a lawyer and or a CPA. I know there have been a lot of jokes about both of these professions, but in this case they will be very much worth their money.

A similar method is to give a residual interest in an asset. You can give an asset, such as real estate, to your favorite charity and retain use of the asset until your death. At that time, the asset irrevocably belongs to the charity. Because the gift is irrevocable on your death, you receive a tax receipt at the time the gift is made. As with the charitable remainder trust, the tax receipt is only for a fraction of the value of the asset. This can be an especially good method of benefiting a charity and preventing an asset such as your home from becoming subject to a Medicaid lien. The life estate that you retain will allow you to live in the home for as long as you or your spouse are alive. Please note that there are other non-charitable ways of protecting your house as well. If this is something that would appeal to you, please seek legal counsel.

A further way to give significant sums to charity is through a gift annuity. In this type of planning, you give money to the charity which in turn buys an annuity which pays you an income annually for the rest of your life. The annuity can continue after your death until the death of your spouse. A large portion, or possibly all, of the payments are tax free and you may also receive a tax receipt that can be used to reduce income tax in the year of the gift. This gift instrument, although similar to the charitable remainder Unitrust and the Charitable Annuity Trust, has the advantage of providing immediate benefits to the charity. The cost of this advantage is that the annuities' assets are not set aside in a trust to fund payments. Therefore it is less secure than the trust

options. Again it is important to seek legal counsel and the tax advice before investing in this type of instrument.

Finally, life insurance can be used to obtain immediate tax relief. If you already have a policy, but no longer need the coverage it provides, you can give the policy to a charity by changing its ownership to that charity. This will provide you with an immediate tax break - you will receive a receipt from the charity for the cash surrender value of the policy plus any accumulated dividends and interest less the amount of any loans against the policy. As you continue to pay the premiums on the policy in future years, you will also receive annual tax receipts for those payments. At your death, the charity, which must be named as beneficiary of the policy, receives the proceeds from the insurance.

Some of these methods of charitable giving are much more complicated and have limitations that I could not go into without boring you more than I have.

Please see your local CPA or attorney for the really boring parts. Have a great holiday season. And don't forget that probably the best benefit of charitable giving is the joy you have in your heart of helping the Lord's work.
