


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Park Ridge Health Gives \$100,000

Since 1986 Park Ridge Health has been a prominent Adventist institution in the Fletcher community, providing healthcare and jobs to many over the years. Nestled in the mountains of North Carolina, the hospital has strong ties to the two neighboring Adventist schools: Fletcher Academy and Captain Gilmer Christian School. İn past years Park Ridge has done a number of things to give back and support both schools. The most recent project to support our education system is the matching program. Park Ridge pledged to match funds up to \$100,000 from all donations given to the two schools from alumni weekend to December 15th of last year. The matched money will be divided into two categories. The first half will be given to the two schools to use for whatever projects they deem necessary. The other half will be used as a tuition subsidy for staff of the Corporation who wish to send their children to Southern Adventist University, the University for the Southern Union. Most staff Adventist institutions receive conference benefits such as subsidies. Since Fletcher Academy is a selfsupporting school, staff do not receive

such assistances. Now, being able to provide some type of subsidy, college can become much more affordable for employee families.

Close ties like these are the ones that help Adventist communities grow. As Mr. Jimm Bunch, President/CEO of Park Ridge said, "For Adventist communities to work well you need strong schools, strong churches, and if there is a hospital, you need a strong hospital too. If the hospital is able to exceed its budget in the future, the matching program can continue."

Having several Adventist institutions in one place is very helpful. Each can help support the others in their ministry. "We view that we are all in this together," said Mr. Bunch. All the institutions here share a common mission and according to Mr. Bunch, "We want to touch people's lives for Jesus." Through programs like this, people and communities are impacted in a positive way and are able to see Christ and the spirit of giving that is evident in Park Ridge Hospital.

Mr. Cantrell first came in contact with Fletcher Academy through one of the businesses he helped fund and operate. Through this business, a truck stop near Naples, NC, he was put into contact with many staff members and began to do business with Fletcher Academy itself. Robert Hansen, present trustee of the Cantrell Trust Fund and graduate of Fletcher Academy, had known and worked with Mr. Cantrell in the past would often speak favorably of the Academy. As a result of this and other relationships, Mr. Cantrell began to donate to many worthy causes on campus. He has supported our efforts to strengthen the academics, work ethic, and character of our students.

Last year Mr. Cantrell's generous contribution were able to helped with the renovation of the Home Economics Department here at the Academy, secured new lab equipment for our science department, purchased safer equipment for our mechanics shop, and helped enhance our businesses where our students are employed. This year, his donations are covering physics equipment for the physics lab, models for the Anatomy and Physiology class, and reference books for classrooms.

Many people here at Fletcher have never even heard of Mr. Cantrell or what he has done for this school. Hopefully, with all that he has given to us, we in turn may give recognition and appreciation to such an inspiring individual. His great contributions have greatly aided

Leaving a Living Legacy

A Tribute to Inspire and Challenge -Howard and Gwen Pendleton



The dictionary would define Legacy as a gift handed down from one person to another. Something that is left behind like money, jewels or a large mansion. At Fletcher, a legacy can mean much more than just material goods. Legacy for us means sharing what you have bequeathing values learned, valuables. Offering yourself and making it meaningful. Making a difference for eternity. Howard and Gwen Pendleton left a living legacy. Many of you remember them. There have been many who have given much to Fletcher and here is a story of a couple that inspired and challenged us.

Howard and Gwen met at an Adventist Academy in South Lancaster, Massachusetts in 1943. They were married in 1947 after Howard served honorably in the US Army. Returning to a small apartment after a short honeymoon they had just enough money for a bag of groceries and a new broom. Howard immediately found work as a carpenter and within a year or so, purchased tools and a truck and went into business for himself. The early years were full of hard work and as time passed Howard and Gwen were blessed with 6 children. The Pendletons were committed to raise their family in the Lord, believing that the best environment for raising children would include; strong family, a good church and Christian education. Family worships were a daily occurrence and always included stories, prayer and

singing, with each child having their own Bible and song book. In 1963 Howard made a trip to Fletcher, NC. He had heard about a small school in the country with high standards and was determined to do what he felt was best for his family. On Sabbath he received a warm welcome at the Fletcher Church and even got invited home for lunch. At the Academy, Howard felt impressed with the sincere, dedicated staff that he met and in short decided that Fletcher was the place to raise his family. On the return trip to South Lancaster his mind was set. He would set aside his business interests. pull-up stakes and move his family south.

Being self-employed and relocating with a large family would not be easy. Grit would be required, failure was not an option. Howard started small with his construction company, but later added real estate and property management to support his family. He was committed to availing Christian education to each of his children. Faithful participation and involvement with various church ministries was also an important family activity. Howard's love for young people presented teaching opportunities each Sabbath. Always willing, he was involved with prayer meetings, pathfinders, and for many years served as Church Elder and School Board Member. Gwen was ever at this side and together they worked as a team. She managed the financial aspects of the companies by keeping the books and paying the bills. She was a homemaker whose energy never seemed to falter. She would be up at the crack of dawn to get the day going. She was an amazing organizer within the household and somehow managed to balance all the various home, church and community related activities. Her love for others was often demonstrated with shared pies, loaves of bread, meals, or flowers.

Howard had a strong work ethic, deep convictions and he sincerely believed the self-supporting mission of Fletcher. In the 80's when the Fletcher Hospital was sold, Howard, along with Jerry Nash and other supporters had a vision and the courage to develop Fletcher Park Inn. Believing that students could be trained to meet the needs of retirees and recognizing the necessity to provide work opportunities for students, the project soon began. Choosing to work along with the kids over retirement, Howard volunteered his construction experience to train unskilled students how to build. What exists on campus today is a testament to thousands of hours of Fletcher Academy student labor. In addition to Fletcher Park Inn, Howard and his sons were involved with planning and building the Lelia Patterson Center. This facility that has proved such a blessing to campus life also required financial support and sacrifices that came in many ways during the period of construction.

Over the years, Howard and Gwen remained generous and unflagging supporters of Fletcher Academy. They never regretted the cost of Christian education and considered it their best investment. They were proud that all six of their children graduated from Fletcher Academy, followed by 9 grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren, currently in attendance. Howard and Gwen left a large legacy within their family who continue to love and support Fletcher. Simply put, Fletcher would not be where it is today had not God led this family here in 1964. There is no doubt that God, knowing the needs of Fletcher, has placed upon the hearts of people a desire to support its ongoing mission. The story of Fletcher includes countless families and individuals who have answered a call to serve God. Many, including the Pendletons, discover that blessing and happiness attend those who are willing to serve a cause which is larger than themselves.

Howard has been gone now for 14 years. On December 20, 2014, surrounded by her children, Gwen, his beloved wife quietly passed away. Some may say this chapter has ended, but I would say that the story continues. Fletcher today still attracts people for many of the same reasons it did 50, 60 and even 100 years ago. The work that has been started must be finished. A foundation laid

must be built upon. High standards must be held up. Values instilled will be passed on and a good example set, will be followed. Howard and Gwen gave their whole lives to build others up and serve the Fletcher community. They remained faithful to God and through lives well lived, left a living legacy.

Each year the Alumni Officers choose an alumnus or alumna whose life reflects the core values of Fletcher Academy. The fourth annual Alumnus of the Year award was presented to Dr. Milton Conley during the 2014 Alumni Weekend church service.

Dr. Conley graduated from Fletcher Academy in 1976. He received his medical degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He also received specialty training in vascular surgery from Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, Texas and endovascular surgery at University of California, Los Angeles. Though he is referred to as a "vascular surgeon with world class credentials" he encourages patients to improve their health through lifestyle changes. "Quit smoking, exercise, eat healthfully, and put me out of business," is a phrase that he uses on a daily basis.

Dr. Conley has pursued his medical training with focused intensity. Yet he has been quick to share his gratitude with those who have influenced his life in a positive way. For his 50th birthday celebration, his wife Stephanie organized a dinner party in Asheville, at The Grove Park Inn. Over 29 students received scholarships this year, and over \$15,000 are awarded in alumni scholarships per year. The alumni also make personal donations. One alumnus gives \$10,000 per year while others give upwards of \$500. The generosity and dedication of Fletcher's alumni is truly astounding.
